



May Scholarships

Aronson/Willis Memorial Award (a Howard County General Hospital award)


Two individual \$2000 scholarships will be awarded to one graduating male and one graduating female. Applicants must have participated in at least two varsity sports while maintaining the highest grade point average. Applications are available in the counseling center and are due May 4, 2012.

GenOn/US Hispanic Youth Entrepreneur Education

This \$5000 grant is disbursed in four \$1250 allotments over the course of four years. Applicants must be of Hispanic descent, pursue a major in Science, Technology, Engineering, or Mathematics (STEM) fields, and have a GPA of 2.75.
