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March Scholarship Deadlines Approaching

NEW: Leslie Moore Foundation Scholarship:

This \$2500 scholarship is for a student who is a US citizen or a permanent resident. Applicants must have verifiable community service and a cumulative GPA of 2.0 or better. The online application can be found at <u>http://scholarships.mycbf.net/STARS/</u>. The deadline is March 1, 2012.

Dance Scholarship for Randolph Macon College:

The department of dance is offering dance scholarships valued between \$6000 to \$18000, which are renewable for four years. Dance scholarship winners are not required to major or minor in dance. Interested dancers should apply for admission to Randolph College and submit a concise portfolio of their training and performances. Early submission is recommended. Columbia Chapter Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Scholarship and Awards:

This scholarship is for African American high school seniors. The minimum GPA must be 2.5. An essay is also part of the application and an interview may be required. The deadline for this scholarship and awards is March 10, 2012. Applications are available in the counseling center.

Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., Kappa Phi Lambda Chapter:

The Alpha Foundation of Howard County funds the education programs and efforts of the chapter, which is based in Howard County. These programs include the presentation of nine scholarships to high school seniors who have excelled academically. Scholarships are reserved for applicants planning to attend two or four year colleges or universities. All applicants must be African American and residents of Howard County or enrolled in a Howard County school. Applications must be postmarked no later than March 14, 2012 and are available in the counseling center.

NEW: Howard County Foundation for Black Educational and Cultural Achievement:

This scholarship is for African American students who have been Howard County residents for at least 15 months prior to the date of the scholarship award. Applicants must have a GPA of 2.5 and must be US citizens or permanent US residents. Applicants must have demonstrated a special talent or ability in some specific area or have exhibited leadership qualities and performed community service. The deadline for the application is March 15, 2012 and can be downloaded from <u>http://</u><u>hcfbeca.community.officelive.com</u>.

NEW: Maryland PTA Scholarship:

This scholarship is offered to students who plan on pursuing a career in education in the public schools of Maryland. Financial need, academic record, and student resume will also be considered with each application. All applicants must have a 2.75 un-weighted minimum grade point average. The application is due on March 15, 2012. Please see your counselor for an application.

Jewish Community Services (JCS) General Scholarship:

This scholarship is for Jewish students from single parent homes. The factors that the JCS Scholarship Committee will consider are financial need, academic performance and potential, extracurricular and community activities, part-time and summer employment, and Jewish community involvement. The deadline for this application is March 15, 2012 and the website to obtain an application is <u>www.jcsbaltimore.org/jcs-scholarship-program</u>.

Newhoff Scholarship:

This scholarship will be awarded to a Jewish student with documentation of a diagnosed learning disability. Students do not need to be from single parent homes to be eligible. The Jewish
