We are very proud to have our daughter attend Guilford Elementary School and are very happy with her education, and the staff we work with. This past fall, I watched the development of the elementary school redistricting plan and how it would affect our school. I understand the need for such moves and realize that not everyone is going to be happy. I have great compassion for those making the decisions. It must be very difficult to decide who would go where, and how neighborhoods get divided, and how children would move schools for just one year, until they entered middle school. This can never be easy for The Board of Education to deal with and yet it is inevitable with all of the development in our area.

I currently volunteer as much as I can at our school and with the PTA. With the changes in the 2012-2013 year, due to redistricting, we are losing 90% of our PTA members. These volunteers live in the Kings Contrivance neighborhood of Dickinson and that is what Guilford is losing. This is much higher than we normally would lose and I worry how we are going to function next year as a PTA.

Our PTA helps with such events as our Fall Festival, half-day student activities during parent/teacher conferences, movie night, game night, bingo night, Roller-skating, Fitness night, wellness fair, school staff appreciations, volunteers for classroom and school-wide activities, contributions to school field trips and assemblies. I worry about next year and how we are going to organize and staff such events.

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April Scholarship Deadlines Approaching

John T. McCraw Scholarship

The National Federation of the Blind of Maryland will include two scholarships in the amounts of \$2000 and \$1500, which will be awarded to legally blind students who exhibit academic achievement and community involvement. Applicants must be legal residents of the State of Maryland, or is pursuing post-secondary studies in the State of Maryland, and will be enrolled as a full-time student at any post-secondary institution. Applications are available in the counseling center and are due on April 20, 2012.

Barbara Balter Entrepreneurial Spirit Scholarship

The Baltimore Regional Chapter of the National Association of Women Business Owners will award two \$1000 scholarships. 
