## The Publisher's Notes

Anyone remotely familiar with the Howard County School System is aware of the concept of the "Achievement Gap" - a term that describes the discrepancy in academic performance among student groups in the county.

This phenomenon is not distinct to this county alone – it is part of a trend, nation-wide. According to the data some racial and economic groups perform better academically and get into less behavioral trouble than other groups. The data is statistical and in no way suggests that by virtue of being part of a particular group that an individual is destined to perform better or worse than any other student.

In so many cases, you will find that there are significant numbers of children achieving superior results on tests despite the fact that they are in a declining group. In the reverse side of this issue, you can find poorly performing students who belong to the high achieving groups.

There is enough evidence to suggest that the achievement gap can be closed over time, but the chord has not yet been struck in Howard County that would indicate such a reality here. Every four years, men and women run for one of the three open slots on the county school board. Almost always, the achievement gap is a primary issue that is addressed by most candidates and then fades into the background with the assortment of pressing issues facing the board.

With the general election only months away, it may be time to make the gap a major issue. In time, Howard County may lose its standing as the top education county if this issue is not directly addressed and resoundingly solved.


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## April Scholarship Deadlines Approaching
