## Savage Firefighters Rewarded with State of Art Firehouse at Route One & Corridor Rd



After serving the county in a dilapidated building over 50 years old, the Savage Fire Department is rewarded with a new state-of-art fire station on the corner of Route One and Corridor Road.

The Savage Volunteer Fire Company has moved locations from its former station on Lincoln Street to a new building at the intersection of Route 1 and Corridor Road.

The firefighters moved to this new station June 1 and held an opening ceremony June 14.

The original station, built in 1957, was no longer able to meet the needs of the company, according to Howard County Fire and Rescue Services spokeswoman, Jacqueline Kotei.

"It was old. It was dilapi-

dated and had reached a point where doing upgrades and revamping various aspects was not in the best interest cost-wise," Ms. Kotei said.

The station was over 50 years old and could not keep up with modern upgrades, such as the fire truck apparatuses. "We had pieces that wouldn't even fit in the station because things were a lot different in terms of cars back then," Ms. Kotei said. "Being able to accommodate 21 career personnel as well as the 80 active volunteer members just really took something that was going to be able to meet the needs."

The new station has many benefits, including energy-efficient and environmentally-friendly updates. Some new features include automatic lights and solar panels on the roof.

Ms. Kotei said, "We've had significant reduction in the cost as well, just as a result of the way the design is."

An evacuation center was also built into the new station. In case of emergency, the station will provide a space with cots to house members of the community. In non-emergency situations, it serves as an all-purpose community room.

## *The Publisher's Notes*

Last week I wrote a blog regarding crime in Columbia and how that our population growth will exacerbate the problem. In the discussion I wondered about both our passive and active involvement in support of perpetrators of crime. *You can find the article at <http://www.guilfordgazette.com/blog/>.*

In our schools, parents too often switch to automatic pilot in defense of their darling offspring, friends of aspiring thugs often remain silent when they hear of bad behavior, and our criminal justice system treats juveniles like fragile eggs. I did not mention (but should have) that residents too often refuse to intervene when they see disruptive behavior by the neighbor's kids.

Thug behavior is so often tolerated. In the blog, I advocated for some old-fashioned discipline, a boot up the rear end, or at least an acknowledgement that Johnny is bad. In this week's Publisher's Notes, I want to flip the coin and advocate for some old-time religion. For every boot that creases the pants of a young man's rear end, the purveyor of the kick might also consider some kneeling prayers.

Before applying the kick, you might get a word from above regarding the amount of pressure to apply or you may be provided with just the right words to convey to the young scofflaw. The right words can work as salve to lessen the impact of the discipline, while maintaining the effectiveness of the pummeling (from the child's perspective) that the young person is receiving.

So who is it that might consider praying? First of all, the peer of any *wannabe* criminal should be in prayer. A contemporary can have the most impact in many situations. Many young folks go through a phase where the words of the inexperienced are more valued than those of the aged. For this reason, the actions of a peer cannot be understated. Also on that list of petitioners are teachers, school administrators, police, neighbors, parents, siblings, and judges.

The prayers should not only be in regard to how to apply discipline. Those persons in our community who believe that prayer works might consider being engaged regularly in prayer for our youth and our communities at large.

Crime is a never-ending problem in life, but our attitudes about raising our youth and how to deal with them can be the difference between young people who are productive in society versus those who are destructive.

In the final analysis, each adult is responsible for himself regardless of upbringing and schooling. And while that assumption may be true, we all know that the life experiences, successes, and mishaps in a young life will shape the future adult. Every step we take in support of our young people is critical. Our society will be much better if we fully grasp the significance of healthy involvement, discipline and prayer in the lives of the youth within our spheres of influence.

## Residential Development or Appalachian Snaketail?

The Savage community is rebelling against the residential development that could come to the area and threaten the rare species of dragonfly, the Appalachian Snaketail, which lives there.

According to Savage Community Association member, Saki Sakakihara, the developer plans to build 51 units of both duplexes and townhouses on five acres of land behind the Savage Mill and bordering the Little Patuxent River, overlapping the habitat for the dragonfly.

“I’ve studied some satellite photos, and it looks like the edge of the property would be anywhere between 220-340 feet from the river, with the elevation drop being 50-100 feet,” Mr. Sakakihara said. “It’s this close proximity that is a big part of the problem here.”

The dragonfly is listed as “vulnerable” globally as of 2010, which is a step up from its level of “near threatened” 14 years previously. In the state of Maryland, the dragonfly is considered “endangered,” which Mr. Sakakihara said is only one level away from “possibly extirpated

or extinct.”

The development would eliminate five acres of trees, according to Mr. Sakakihara, which would allow rain water to build up and increase erosion of the soil in the area, damaging the environment for the dragonflies.

The dragonfly plays a major role in the ecosystem for the area. It eats mosquitos, flies, and horseflies that could otherwise spread disease. Because it is low on the food chain, it also is an important ecological indicator since “their health can reveal changes in the water ecosystem more quickly than any other plants or animals,” Mr. Sakakihara said.

Mr. Sakakihara said he speaks for the Savage Community Association when he expresses his hope that instead of developing a residential area, the land will be purchased by the County and turned into an addition to Savage Park. It would remain wooded,

and the trails it currently has would be maintained.

Besides the plea for the Appalachian Snaketail dragonfly, the Savage Community Association has appealed to the County Council with several other arguments against the residential development. They claim the townhouses will not fit the historic nature of the town, the traffic will be affected, and the schools will be overcrowded.

Christine Dietrich, a Savage Community Association member, said these additional arguments have been, for the most part, discounted. For example, school overcrowding is not a new issue. In the past, schools have installed portables to their buildings, and Dietrich said the County feels that this problem is not different from times in the past. She hopes the county will think differently for the dragonflies, however. It is a point of no return in their case, once they are gone, they (Continued on Page 15)

# Which Business Structure is Best for You?

Continuing our discussion with respect to Business Structure, this editorial will raise some talking points pertaining to Partnerships.

I will discuss a few of the generalized points of partnerships, and will follow up this editorial with a more detailed discussion with respect to the tax advantages/disadvantages.

### What is a Partnership?

A simple explanation of a Partnership is an Agreement between two or more individuals to finance and operate a business. A Partnership is an entity legally separate from the individuals themselves (however, in a General Partnership, profits and losses flow through the partner's tax returns).

Each partner has equality with respect to authority and responsibility in operating and running the business; they should be involved in the daily operations; and they should execute management decisions.

When the establishment of a Partnership occurs, the below listed arrangements (just to list a few) should be clearly spelled out:

- How will the business be financed?

- Who perform the work of financing the business?
- What are the contingency plans, say if a partner passes away?
- What are the protocols if one or both partners wish to dissolve the business?

### A Few Advantages of a Partnership Include:

- Partnerships are relatively easy to establish.
- The main advantage of having a partner is that he (or she) could very well complement the skill level of the other partner – whether that be an area of expertise; experience; and/or knowledge.
- Often times, a partner may be able to provide investment capital – in other words, funds to help the business grow.
- Also, a partnership may be able to obtain bank loans more easily than a sole proprietorship.
- Common sense tells us that partners must get along personally, and should complement each other's talents, and as partners, the probability of the business succeeding clearly will be obtained if they work as a team.

- Partners can also provide moral support as appropriate – this is quite imperative in troubled times.

### A Few Disadvantages of a Partnership Include:

- All partners are personally liable for the business debts and liabilities, for example, a judgment in a lawsuit. This is commonly referred to as "Unlimited Liability".

- Profits must be shared with others. An agreement needs to be reached as to the value of one partner's time and skills. The easiest method is to split the profit 50% for both partners.

- Disagreements will occur since decisions are shared.

- A partnership may have limitations that

commonly referral to as Unlimited Liabilities.

Sole Proprietorships do not have much financial flexibility – outside capital can be difficult to obtain and personal credit ratings can affect the infusion of start-up funds.

Perhaps most importantly, a Sole Proprietorship is almost completely dependent upon the owner's abilities – if we get sick; have personal problems affecting the business; or if the owner passes away, the business is bound to suffer.

Again, these are just some major talking points, and I am always welcome to comments and suggestions. As always, I wish to



## Six Ways We Can Lower the Risk of Type 2 Diabetes

What can we do about Type 2 Diabetes?

You can lower your risk of developing diabetes with these helpful tips and if you have diabetes, type 2, you can greatly improve your blood sugar levels and overall health by applying these tactics.

Exercise – a 30 minute walk every day can help protect you from insulin resistance. Drink WATER & Ditch the Soda – even DIET soda. All soda impacts you negatively.

Feast on Fiber – use whole grains, beans, lentils, & loads of vegetables. This slows sugar absorption, lowers cholesterol, and helps you lose weight, if needed.

Reject the refined foods – Stop eating the white pasta, rice, breads and pastries as well as all the candy and desserts. Besides added sugar they are usually full of trans-fats.

Limit the animal products – they are full of saturated fats. Replace meat with cold water fish like salmon and add in vegetarian meals each week.

Add cinnamon to your food. As little as ½ tsp. a

day has been shown to help lower blood glucose levels. Twenty-five

years ago we only heard about senior citizens getting type 2 diabetes, but today there are many young adults who are discovering they have it.

What exactly IS diabetes type 2? Our body uses glucose (converted from food) to make energy - it is food for our cells. Just like our stomach can only hold so much food at a time, our cells can only take in so much glucose at a time.

If there is extra floating around in our blood stream it gets stored as fat for later use. Diabetes begins when the glucose in our blood gets too high because we have either routinely put in WAY too much sugar and/or because we eat way too much fat which hinders our body from getting the glucose into the cells.

Our pancreas makes insulin which is a hormone that attaches to the glucose and carries it to the cells and acts like a key to open the cell door and let in the glucose. Our body is designed to make enough insulin for normal metabolism; however, the way most people over-eat the

poor pancreas is pushed to its limit for pumping out insulin.

Over time, the excess sugars and fats cause the body to become insulin resistant. Think of how your ears adjust after awhile to really loud music. You start to tune it out. In the same way it gets harder and harder to get the glucose into the cells.

This is when it becomes dangerous and our blood sugar rises to an unsafe

level. The body reacts by becoming extremely thirsty to help flush out the sugar and the person can become dehydrated from the frequent urination.

The body gets very stressed because the cells are not getting fed; they are like a starving person standing outside of a restaurant drooling at a huge smorgasbord of which they can't partake.

The process of relocating the station was lengthy because many elements were involved. A new facility had to be evaluated, the Maryland Department of Environment had to look at the site, and budget approvals were needed from the County Executive and the County Council, according to Ms. Kotei.

"It was about a two-year process from when we initially broke ground," Ms. Kotei said.

The ability for the firefighters to respond efficiently was the main goal for the new station, according to Ms. Kotei. She said the location of the station

is an improvement from where it was before.

"We service about a 2.29 square mile area, and this station, with where it's positioned, actually gives us better access and more timely support for emergency incidents that are to the north, south, east, and west," Ms. Kotei said. "It kind of puts it right there and allows for personnel to be able to get out to the community and respond a lot quicker."

Ms. Kotei said the firefighters have adjusted quickly to the new location and "it's pretty much business as usual." The company had an important input into the location selection and is happy to have up-to-

date facilities in order to respond best to the community.

Ms. Kotei said, "We're really proud to be able to have a station like this that is able to provide that around-the-clock, 24-7 coverage that our department provides for the community."

cannot come back, she said.

The community has been active in their efforts to stop the development from being built. They have presented their arguments to the zoning board, the Council, and an open forum. They met with Coun-

cil members, Calvin Ball, Jen Terrasa, and Courtney Watson, separately as well.

"We took them on a tour of Savage. We took them around some of the historic areas, showed them the river," Mr. Sakakihara said. "I gave a PowerPoint presentation of the dragonfly."

Dietrich hopes that federal protection might be available for the Appalachian Snaketail dragonfly. Mr. Sakakihara said, "We want to protect the dragonfly while it still has something to protect in this area."
