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Judge Hands Down Two Consecutive Life Sentences for Murder & Attempted Murder



A 21-year-old Laurel man has been sentenced to two, consecutive life sentences plus 51 years for the December 2016 armed robbery and double shooting that resulted in the death of a 20-year-old Columbia man. Davon Philip Jones, of the 9200 block of Bridle Path Lane, was found guilty of all charges, last November following a five-day trial and was sentenced in Howard County Circuit Court on Thursday afternoon.

On December 18, 2016, police were dispatched to the 9400 block of Woodsong Court for a report of gunshots fired. Officers found Kaiyon Stanfield, 20, sitting in the front passenger seat of a compact sedan, suffering from multiple gunshot wounds.

Nearby, they located his cousin, Khalil Stanfield, 21, also suffering from gunshot wounds. Kaiyon Stanfield was airlifted to the University of Maryland Shock Trauma Center and was subsequently pronounced

dead. Khalil Stanfield was also transported to Shock Trauma and was treated.

At sentencing, prosecutors acknowledged trial testimony that the Stanfield cousins drove to the Laurel townhome parking lot to sell a quarter-pound of marijuana to their assailants who were seated in the rear seat.

Jones was convicted of delivering the fatal gunshot to the back of Kaiyon Stanfield's head and shooting Khalil Stanfield twice in the back after Stanfield bolted from the car. Jones co-defendant, Derrick Charles Johnson, 20, of the 3900 block of Warner Avenue, Hyattsville, was convicted in the shooting of Kaiyon Stanfield and a firearms violation following a separate trial, last month, and will be sentenced April 26.

Kaiyon's mother addressed the court and Jones during her victim impact statement. "My life was changed; I'm not the

“Hello. Let me help you with your order over here,” the young man said to me as I entered McDonald’s. He was certainly polite, but also a bit uneasy about his role introducing me to an ordering machine.

There were two of them. The more senior of the two must have noticed the *old-fuddy-duddy, you’ve got to be kidding* look on my face, as I explained that I was paying with cash — the clue to let them know that I was not interested in their high tech job stealer.

She said, “Well, I can take you over here,” meaning the normal counter where normal people go to interact with normal cashiers.

I placed my order for a breakfast sandwich and a small coffee. I don’t need the bread, but this was an unhealthy-conscious moment. The two order-takers were polite and professional, but I couldn’t help think that these poor souls are aiding in their own future demise.

On another day I visited a local Walmart to discover something I had never seen in all of the years since Walmart came on the scene — a cashier with nothing to do. There were actually two cashiers who were not busy. My goodness, automation has grown at Walmart and so has customer acceptance of zero human interaction.

At a regional Royal Farms, there is de-emphasis on humans, with new, state-of-the-art machines that allow experimental customers to make purchases without human interaction. That’s not actually true as the machines are so

Classic Cars Come to the National Mall this Spring

WASHINGTON /PRNewswire/ -- An exhibition of five historically significant automotive treasures will take place in the Nation's Capital starting this month. The Historic Vehicle Association's (HVA) annual Cars at the Capital has been expanded in 2018 and will take place March 30 through April 30.

A total of five vehicles will be displayed during the month-long one-of-a-kind exhibition in the HVA's lighted glass display case.

Located on the walkway between the Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum and the National Gallery of Art, the exhibition is free to the public. Vehicle display schedule is as follows:

March 30 – April 2

1985 Modena Design & Development Spyder – Ferris Bueller's Day Off "Ferrari."

The twenty-second vehicle on the National Historic Vehicle Register is one of three replica Ferrari vehicles built in 1985 by Modena Design and Development, specifically for use in the Ferris Bueller's Day Off (1986) movie.

April 3 – 9

1927 Ford Model T Touring – Fifteen-Millionth Ford. The twenty-third vehicle on the National Historic Vehicle Register is on loan from the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn, MI. Marking the symbolic end of Model T production after 19 years,

the fifteen-millionth Model T was driven out of Michigan's Highland Park Ford Plant by father and son, Edsel and Henry Ford, in May 1927.

April 10 – April 16

1984 Plymouth Voyager – The First Chrysler Minivan. The twenty-fourth vehicle on the National Historic Vehicle Register is on loan from FCA North America LLC in Detroit, MI.

This first-production Chrysler mini-van, pioneered under the direction of Lee Iacocca, was launched at a press conference in November 1983 and established a disruptive movement in redefining automotive versatility.

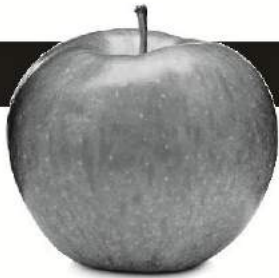

same person I was,” she stated. “What you did to my son has broken my heart and my son’s and my husband’s (hearts).” She recalled the last conversation she had with her son, “It haunts me, it haunts me, and I still don’t know why.” Assistant State’s Attorney Danielle Duclaux added, “The State can’t answer that

question.” Jones offered an apology, prior to sentencing, but contended that he had been framed.

Judge Richard S. Bernhardt stated that based on the pre-sentencing investigation, along with social media videos and photographs presented into evidence, “I have significant concerns that you will ever be rehabilitated.

He sentenced Jones to life without

parole for the murder of Kaiyon Stanfield plus a consecutive life sentence for the attempted murder of Khalil Stanfield. Jones also received consecutive sentences of 20 years for conspiracy to commit armed robbery, 20 years for armed robbery, 10 years for use of a firearm in the commission of a felony and one year for possession of a firearm by a person under age 21.

One day I dropped everything on the counter and left. Apparently, I am supposed to find the “fruit” button to process the order. No time to learn cashiering — I am a customer.

Back at McDonald’s, I asked a customer, who used the machine, what he thought of the process. He said, “Oh I guess it will take a while for customers to adjust.” I thought to myself, “Is this really the sheepish mentality of the populace?” So I pushed a little more, then he revealed another thought. “This is chaos. I ordered my sandwich, but I wanted it well-done and there’s no option for that, so I still needed to go to the front.”

Side note: the place was now getting crowded and visitors to the store were using six stations, aided by staff in some cases.

The gentleman added, “It took a long time for my sandwich to come and when I got it, it was cold.” So much for automation, I thought.

I have grown to a point where I no longer expect top-notch service from most fast-food and convenience stores, but my salvation at such places is human contact. If someone does not bring a little joy to my sometimes dismal life, then perhaps, I can bring a smile, a joke, or a good word to one of them.

Human contact is the highest component of humanity, so I am wondering just a little bit who we will become when 75% or more of our interactions are only with machines. Can we still refer to this confluence as society?

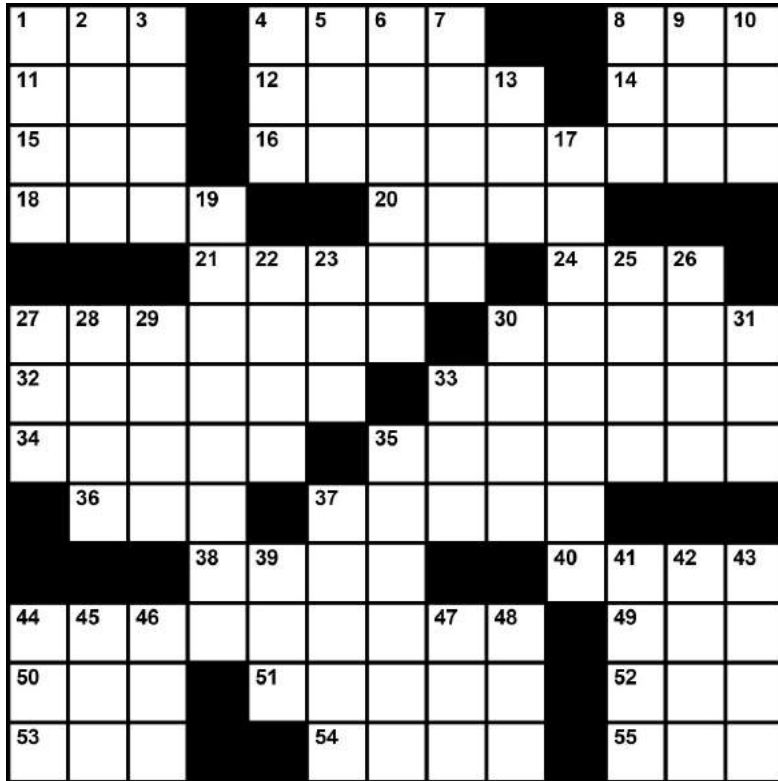

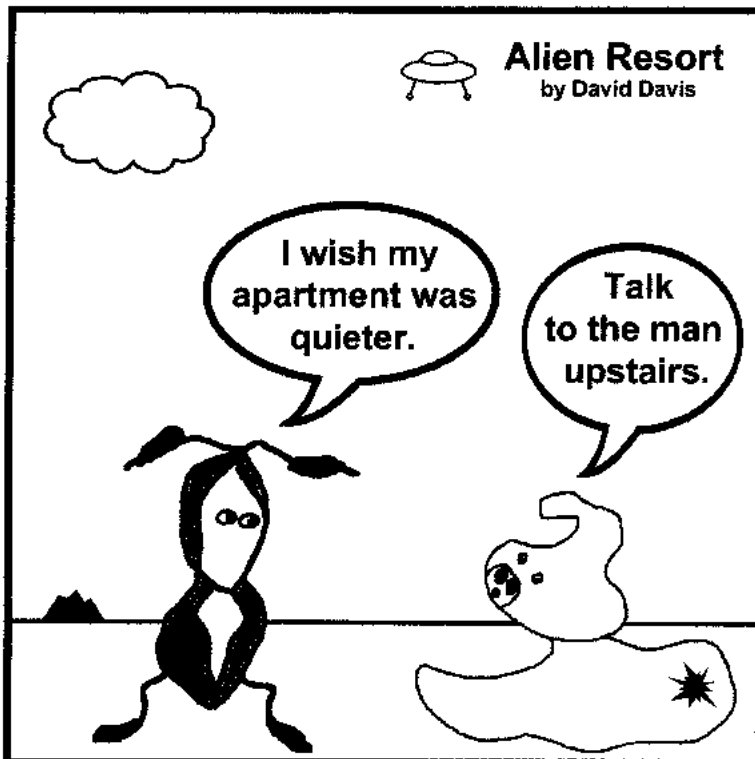

April 17 – 23

1968 Ford Mustang Fastback – Bullitt – '559. The twenty-first vehicle on the National Historic Vehicle Register was announced in January 2018.

Emerging after decades, the suspicions of whether this iconic vehicle existed were laid to rest at the North American International Auto Show. Piloted by Steve McQueen in Bullitt (1968), the Mustang Fastback has been owned by the Kiernan family since Bob Kiernan purchased it through a Road & Track ad in 1974.

To this day, "Bullitt" maintains much of the original modifications from its days of filming on the streets of San Francisco

April 24 – 30

1918 Cadillac Type 57 – U.S. 1257X. The fourth vehicle previously announced on the National Historic Vehicle Register is a remarkable example of preservation.

The Type 57 seven-passenger touring car arrived in Europe before the American Expeditionary Force under the leadership of General John J. Pershing. It was used to transport soldiers and officers, then was used

by Eleanor Butler Roosevelt, wife of Theodore Roosevelt Jr., during her two-month mission to find and create leave locations for soldiers.
